It's worse than Lyme disease...

and spreading faster, according to LymeDisease.org.

It was just Connecticut, Massachusetts, and Rhode Island where the disease called Babesiosis or Babesia, which we humans catch from ticks, was an endemic. Now, according to the <u>CDC</u>, we can add New Hampshire, Maine, and Vermont to the list, making this a full-on significant and major issue for New England.

This disease can be tough stuff, too. According to <u>Boston.com</u>, some of us who get infected with Babesiosis means flu-like symptoms including fever, chills, sweats, headache, body aches, loss of appetite, nausea, or fatigue. Seeing a doctor is a must (and even the ER if necessary) if you have a weak immune system, other health issues and diseases, or no spleen.

According to Boston.com, Yale University researchers in New Haven, Connecticut, and Tufts Medical Center in Boston say this is here to stay, as warmer winters mean ticks live longer and spread the disease more frequently. Add that with Lyme disease already in New Hampshire, Maine, and Vermont, and this just adds to the concern and warnings.

There's no vaccine for either disease .<u>Click</u> <u>here</u> to learn the best ways to prevent babesiosis and Lyme disease, which includes insect repellent when you're out for extended periods of time, especially in more wooded areas. It's also important to conduct full-body exams on yourself, children, and pets.

UNDERSTANDING BRUSHLESS RC MOTOR SPECIFICATIONS

Brushless motors use a standard numbering scheme to describe their physical size and kV rating. For example: let's assume we have a 5055-3000kV Brushless Outrunner Motor. We break the numbers out as follows: [50] [55] -[3000]

• [50] The first two numbers represent the diameter of the motor's housing in millimeters; in this example 50mm

• [55] The second two numbers represent the length of the motor housing in millimeters; in this example 55mm

• [3000] The numbers after the dash represent the kV rating of the motor; in this

example 3000kV. The kV rating (not to be confused with kilo-volt) is the

RPM of the motor (k) per volt (V) with no load. For example, a brushless motor with a kV rating of 3000 powered by a 12V power source would be capable of 36,000 RPMs (multiply 3000x12). This is the max RPMs that this motor can reach under no load. A motor with a higher kV will have more top end speed, but not as much acceleration/torque. A motor with a lower kV will not be as fast, but will accelerate faster and have more torque.

Top Gun 2023

The noontime show was short. Horizon Hobbies had a speed plane that flew at over 200 mph. There was a person who flew a helicopter. Lastly there was a pilot who flew a jet that looked like a BD5. He was an exceptional pilot flying the jet low and slow as well as high speed flight.
